








# Does your child have a parent, grandparent or carer in prison?



Where to go for information and support in Bath & North East Somerset

The arrest and imprisonment of a parent, carer or other family member can be very stressful for the whole family, bringing with it a great deal of uncertainty, upheaval, upset and loss.

It isn't always an easy matter to discuss with anyone. It can impact on your children, your relationships, and your family's finances, housing, health and well-being and leave you feeling isolated.

"The hardest things are that you've got to keep the house going, you've got to look after your children, financially you've got to be independent and then you've got to mentally support someone else when you need that support yourself...I want something back for me, but I haven't got that."

This leaflet provides information on where to go for help and advice in Bath and North East Somerset.

**Health and Well-being:** You can talk confidentially to your GP about issues concerning your family's health and well-being. A child or young person may struggle to come to terms with the sudden absence of their parent and may need support to deal with this.

Information about local services: The Family Information Service (FIS) hosts the 1 Big Database website which holds a wide range of information and advice about local services for families, ranging from childcare to safe lifestyle choices. **Support for children:** Sometimes it can be difficult for you to talk to your child about what is happening around them. They may want to talk to someone else.
