Single Point of Contact (SPOC)

What is a SPOC?

A designated person who is the Single Point of Contact (SPOC) lead within your organisation/school who liaises with other school staff, Invisible Lives Team and other SPOC's in the quadrant.



Invisible Lives

Invisible Lives provides specialist support to the most vulnerable groups of children, young people and their families when affected by; the criminal justice system, risk taking behaviours and hidden harms.

What does a SPOC do?

- Champions the needs of children and young people affected by parental imprisonment or the Criminal Justice System (CJS).
- Ensures a whole school approach to recognising the importance of understanding the effects of the CJS on children, young people and their families.
- The lead person for children and young people to speak to in confidence.
- The lead person for parents/carers to speak to discuss their family situation if additional support is required complete an Invisible Lives Child and Family Support referral.
- Ensure all staff/colleague are informed and updated on Invisible Lives and the services they offer.
- A SPOC lead can make a judgement on support required:
 Does the child need extra care and understanding within
 the school or would they benefit from Invisible Lives
 support or other services?

How to become a SPOC and what is expected of you

To become a SPOC you need to;

- Complete Invisible Lives Training
- Sign up to our charter
- Attend 3 meetings a year within your quadrant
- Share best practice and data

As a SPOC you will receive regular updates, hear from guest speakers at meetings and be invited to additional training sessions.
